Upon ascertaining a detailed description of the property will furnish the names of the persons for inclusion in the general biological property file.

Entrance to the large home of the Croppers was gained at eight through a window on the ground floor, after the screen was cut. Detective [redacted] of the West Los Angeles Police Division, who is assigned to the case, states that he believed it was the work of local crooks and not experienced burglars. He based his opinion on the fact that three fingerprints, freshly left by the robbers, were found on the piano still and other places in the house, and the further fact that the robbery carried away a heavy weighing scale from the bathroom and other untraceable articles of small value.

The fingerprints above mentioned were photographed by the Los Angeles Police Department, and copies are being transmitted to the Bureau under separate cover; however, the prints are not clear, and Captain [redacted] of the investigation division of the Los Angeles Police Department advised that they could not be identified.

[redacted] Bernstein-Kunsky Corporation, Hollywood, who are insurance brokers, furnished the following description of the jewelry and a description of the money obtained from the home:

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

This investigation is predicated upon an article appearing in the Los Angeles newspaper reporting a burglary at the home of the motion picture star, GARY COOPER, 11947 Concourse Drive, East Los Angeles, California, on October 20, 1936, when jewelry and furs valued at about \$15,000.00 were reported stolen.

The Cooper's are vacationing in the West and are expected to return the first part of November. Secretary to Mrs. Cooper, Mrs. George Clegg of the home of the film star reported the loss as she was able to obtain the list of jewels and fur articles. She stated that the list is subject to revision with regard to the Cooper's who have a large number of furs.

With reference to the report of special Agent E. J. Ooban, Los Angeles, Calif., dated 11-10-36, in the above entitled case, enclosed find two photographs of fingerprints lifted from the windowsill and window-pane of the Gary Cooper home, 11940 Chaparral Drive, East Los Angeles, Calif., after the home had been entered by burglars on the night of October 20, 1936, at which time about \$15,000.00 in jewelry and furs was stolen.

These prints were photographed by the Los Angeles Police Department who reported that they were unable to classify them, and that they appeared to be of no value for identification purposes. It is thought possible that the prints would be clear enough to enable a search being made of the Bureau's single fingerprint file.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Cooper, 11940 Chaperon Drive, Los Angeles, California, was entered by burglars on the night of October 26, 1938, and jewelry and furs of the approximate value of \$12,000.00 were stolen. Entrance was forced through a window, and the Coopers were vacationing in New York at the time. To date, no trace of the property has been found, nor has the identity of the thieves been established.

For inclusion in the National Stolen Property file, the following description of the said furs and jewelry is here set out:-

Mr. Cooper stated that nothing had been heard or seen by the others property either by investigating or the Detective Department, he had nothing to do with Mr. Cooper and as to whether or not he came to the room, he does not know that he ever did. That the 1961 robbery was the only robbery he had been a part of and that he had not been part of any other previous or subsequent robberies and that they were all on his grounds since about 1960 and he is the only one left.

Police Descriptions
The West Los Angeles Division, Los Angeles Police Department, stated that they have not been able to locate any of the stolen property or establish identity of the burglar(s) that took the items mentioned in the police call log and moreover, that the items taken were not described in detail except for the necklace and some articles of the jewelry failed to identify them as jewelry in the log.

Mr. Cooper stated that he has no knowledge of any persons involved in the 1961 robbery and that Los Angeles Police Department has no record of any information concerning him.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS

A thorough investigation by the Los Angeles Police Department and Bureau Investigators failed to locate any of the stolen jewels or other property, or to develop any information as to whether any of this property had been transported interstate.

DETAILS:

At 101 South Figueroa Street, Los Angeles, California.

Mrs. MARY COOPER of 101 South Figueroa Street advised that no trace had been found of any of the stolen jewelry at their residence; that her son Mr. Cooper had been called over two or three times, up to a month ago, by the police to see if the stolen jewelry remained there longer, but that none of it had been recovered; that the insurance company had paid the loss and that she and Mr. Cooper had despaired of ever recovering any of the jewelry.

[REDACTED] Bernstein-Knady Corporation, insurance brokers, advised agent that his investigators and the police department had not been able to locate any of the stolen jewelry, and that the loss of a little over \$15,000.00 had been paid by the insurance companies to the Coopers.

Detective-Lieutenant [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] of the West Los Angeles Police Station, who have been working on this case since the burglary on October 20, 1934, stated that they have not been able to trace one article of jewelry or clothing, or other property, and that in cooperation with the Pawn Shop and Robbery Details of the Police Department a most diligent investigation had been made. Lieut. [REDACTED] stated that it is their opinion that a well organized local gang is responsible for this and several other burglaries in and around Hollywood within the last year, but that not a clue had been developed as to their identity. Working on the theory that the jewelry had been melted and sold as old gold, a thorough check was made of all old-gold buyers in Los Angeles and vicinity, but no trace has been found of the Cooper jewels.

Lieutenant [REDACTED] stated that a check had been made of all known or suspected fences, as well as all pawn shops and dealers in second-hand clothing, without success; that it had been hoped to establish the identity of the burglars through some of the articles stolen which could be readily identified, such as the motion picture cameras and projecting machine, watches, bathroom scales, and other articles which are usually discarded or thrown away.

Lieutenant [REDACTED] said further that a check had been made of all fur dealers and merchants in an effort to identify some of the property of Mrs. Cooper, with the same unproductive result. He stated also that an investigation of the second-hand clothing shops had failed to locate any of the suit, or skirt, or other clothing, of Mr. Cooper's, which comprised about \$100.00 worth of loss.

No evidence or clue having been developed to indicate that any of this property has been transported interstate, this investigation is, for the present, being closed.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

J. J. MURKIN, Inspector for the Pullman Company, Chicago, reported that subject [REDACTED] officer on the train, struck twice to bring about his finding diamond pictures which he had taken on January 19, 1938, [REDACTED] Los Angeles and Albuquerque, New Mexico, which had been reported lost that date in a robbery set by the [REDACTED], S. J. McNeely, of Los Angeles. [REDACTED] on July 22d passed this [REDACTED] in Chicago, which he received July 1938, after being questioned by police, Pullman and Santa Fe agents, and sufficient for insurance company relatives to settle. He was later discharged from his position. Assistant United States Attorney - L. CONKLIN, Chicago, Illinois, advised he would prosecute.

DETAILS:

In effect from July 26, 1938, J. J. MURKIN, Inspector, Special Forces Department, Pullman Company, 1225 South State Street, Chicago, Illinois, furnished the following information:

On June 29, 1938, about 10:30 a.m., subject [REDACTED] struck twice to bring about his finding diamond pictures which he had taken on January 19, 1938, [REDACTED] Los Angeles and Albuquerque, New Mexico, which were the property of [REDACTED].

LEVISON, 200 South Bristol Street, Brentwood Park, Los Angeles, California, who was a passenger on this train from Chicago to Los Angeles, Mrs. LEVISON reported that this watch was lost near Las Vegas, New Mexico, about 12:30 P.M., January 1932, and reported it as a French ladies watch, carrying forty-two small round diamonds, platinum case, Case No. 7477, Glycine movement, No. 4631, seventeen jewels. She reported this loss to the Pullman conductor, giving its value as \$250.00. At the time she reported the loss she stated that the last time she saw this watch was when she was en her way from her Pullman to the dining car.

Inspector FITZGERALD stated that the Pullman Company furnished this information to the Chicago Police Department February 5, 1932, and on July 19th the Penn Stop Detail of the Chicago Police Department reported that this watch had been placed in pawn for \$20.00 on July 12, 1932, at the Palace Loan Company, 216 East 47th Street, Chicago, by a colored man giving his name as [redacted], address [redacted]

J.C.
Investigation by Inspector FITZGERALD and Division Special Agent A. G. KAPER, of the Santa Fe Railroad, disclosed that [redacted] was a colored waiter on this same train, The Chief, on January 19th, on which date the watch was reported lost. Investigation by them showed that [redacted] would arrive in Chicago on the same train, The Chief, on July 19th, at which time he was picked up and questioned by Inspector FITZGERALD, Santa Fe Division Special Agent KAPER, Detective Cross, of the Penn Stop Detail of the Chicago Police Department, and WILLIAM YOUNG, representative of Paul's Jewelers, insurance adjuster of Chicago, whereupon he admitted finding this watch and knowing same had been lost on the train on which he was working, the watch being found on the floor of the Pullman which was next to the dining car, which Pullman was the train from the Pullman which was occupied by Mrs. LEVISON and her husband.

The written statement made by [redacted] to his above named interrogator is as follows:

"I was going to call porters for lunch between Los Angeles and Alameda. They stopped me and said they had my watch. I told them I had lost it on the train. They said it was mine."

"I picked it up and gave it [redacted] no report of it to my men on train."

I was not interviewed by any one about it; although I heard there had been a watch lost on train.

I brought watch back to Chicago and on July 12th 1970 I pawned it at Palace Loan Co. 216 N. 47th St for sum of \$20.00.

On arrival in Chicago on train #20 July 1970 I was met at train by police and accompanied officers to pawn shop and redeemed watch and turned it over to the officers. I did not have any conversation with anyone who lost the watch.

Inspector FITZGERALD stated that after [redacted] had made this written statement and redeemed the watch at the Palace Loan Company he was circumstances from his acquaintance that as the insurance company had paid MRS. LEVISON \$250.00, the value which she placed on the watch, instant watch was turned over to the adjusters for the insurance company, Fidelity & Guaranty; that Mrs. LEVISON had been advised of the recovery of the watch and as it was a bangle and of especial value to her, arrangements were being made by the insurance adjusters to return instant watch to MRS. LEVISON on payment of the \$250.00. Inspector FITZGERALD further stated that MRS. LEVISON, in reporting this matter, had admitted that the clasp had been loose on the watch, and it appeared that her husband had warned her that she would be very likely to lose it if she continued to wear it.

Inspector FITZGERALD reported that he has advised neither there would be any federal prosecution concerning instant matter.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS

Investigation at Los Angeles has failed to definitely establish whether the Glycine watch movement which was stolen from Mrs. GARY COOPER in 1936, is identical with the movement which was later stolen from Mrs. CLIVE J. LEVISON. Mrs. LEVISON'S watch examined, had photographs of same secured.

DETAILS

Transcript of reference transmitted to the Los Angeles Office a copy of the report of Special Agent A. E. Tamm, Chicago, Illinois, dated 9/10/38, in the case entitled [REDACTED] theft from Interstate Freight. This report disclosed that on January 13, 1938 Mrs. CLIVE J. LEVISON, of Los Angeles, lost her wrist watch while traveling between Chicago and Los Angeles, on the Santa Fe Railway. Mrs. LEVISON'S watch was described as follows:

On January 21, 1937, a Plymouth sedan, carrying fifty-two small round lead weights, platinum case, Case No. 37,200, silver mount No. 2,631, seventeen jewels, was recovered.

According to L. E. Tamm's report, the lead watch was later recovered in a Chicago pawn shop, where it had been pawned by [REDACTED], a Tolman dinner waiter. Prior to its recovery in the Chicago pawn shop, Tamm is a Hastings, Minnesota, adjuster, and paid Mr. J. W. Johnson for the lead watch she had pawned.

The Bureau Agent in charge has directed that the task of the Los Angeles Office is to find that a platinum case and watch with serial number No. 2,631, and No. 37,200 or one of the two which were pawned in the \$5,000.00 value, and the which were pawned in the amount of the value of Mr. and Mrs. GUY COOPER, 1934, General Agents, San Francisco, California, on the basis of information received.

It will be noted that while the lead watch and the watch described above are different, they may be identical, or the watch may be identical. It is also possible that the number 2,631, which appears on the watch, is not the serial number of the watch.

Information concerning the above should be given to the San Francisco office.

Mr. LEVISON stated that undoubtedly his agent or Lury Insurance Agency could advise Agent concerning the final disposition of the vehicle, which was recently turned by Mr. LEVISON.

SAYFERTHE, President of Sayfert & Levy Insurance Agency, 707 South Hill Street, Los Angeles, advised that his company is agent for the Firestone Tire & Rubber Company, Southern California Service Branch, 345 South Spring Street, Los Angeles, and at the time of the interview was in the possession of CLIFFORD D. HUMPHREY, one of the officials of the Firestone Tire & Rubber Company.

Continuing, Mr. SAYFERTHE advised that he is acquainted with CLIFFORD D. HUMPHREY, and has always considered HUMPHREY to be a man of high integrity, that LEVISON's statement is a reality, leather manufacturer, and that LEVISON's explanation of his wife's ownership of the vehicle appears probable and reasonable.

R. C. CURRY, Vice President of the Firestone Tire & Rubber Company, Los Angeles, informed the interviewee that he is a friend of Mr. LEVISON, and expressed his desire to support him in every way possible. Mr. CURRY permitted Agent to take the LEVISON vehicle for the purpose of having it photographed, and also for the purpose of having it examined by his automobile mechanic, in an effort to determine cause of the accident mentioned, No. 4, 611, which occurred five days ago, LEVISON said.

JAMES O. HORNIG, Vice President of the Mutual Casualty Company, Los Angeles, informed the interviewee that he is a friend of Mr. LEVISON, and that he is not in contact with him.

Mr. DONATI stated that all Glycine movements are imported from Europe by the firm of Peyer Pretzeldeier & Mills, 17 Maiden Lane, New York City, who have a record of all Glycine movements, and who can definitely inform the Bureau whether the number 6,631 is a serial number, or whether the number 6,631 is merely a serial number which appears upon many different Glycine movements.

Mr. E. J. RETTIG, Manager of the Watch Department of Brock & Company, 515 West 7th Street, Los Angeles, examined the leather watch, and stated that, in his opinion, the number 6,631 is not a serial number, and cannot be used to identify this particular Glycine movement, but that the lower plate number 427,122, which appears upon the lower plate of the LEVISON watch is the actual serial number.

Mr. RETTIG suggested that contact be made with Peyer Pretzeldeier & Mills, of New York City, to verify the accuracy of informant's statement.

For the assistance of the New York City Office, there is enclosed herewith a photograph of the Glycine movement of the watch formerly owned by Mrs. I.E. DUTT. This photograph was taken with the latent fingerprint camera, but if viewed with a magnifying glass, the number "6,631" can be readily seen.

AS TO THE CITY

In connection with the undeveloped lead in the reference report of Special Agent BOYD, the photograph of the Glycine movement of the wrist watch furnished by Mrs. G. H. COOPER of BETTER FEELINGS & MILLS, 17 Madison Avenue, New York, indicates that the date stamped on the watch movement only indicated the date on which the watch was manufactured, or in other words, the year 1931; but it is not the practice of the manufacturer or the importers to stamp the name of the manufacturer nor the address of those importers. It is felt, however, that one of the Glycine movements imported in the year 1931 would carry a date number, and, therefore, none of the imports to this date in 1931 will carry a date number.
