Dear Sir:

On May 29, 1937, a confidential informant of this New York Office informed Special Agent E. E. Moran that he had received information from another informant to the effect that approximately seven and one-half years ago about \$60,000 in jewelry was stolen from Gary Cooper and Lupita Veliz in or near Hollywood, Cal., as a result of which an unknown person was sentenced to serve approximately seven years. He indicated that the source of his information disclosed that the person responsible for the theft actually was not sentenced for the jewelry theft, but did receive a sentence for some crime and has been incarcerated in a prison until recently.

The informant of this office continued by stating that the actual thief intends to secure the jewelry, which is now concealed in a house some place in Hollywood, Cal. Our informant did not receive any information that a violation of the National Stolen Property Act exists, it being noted that the theft occurred prior to the passage of the Act, although it is possible that there has been some transportation of the stolen property since the passage of the Act.

Additional information was furnished by our informant on June 1, 1937, to the effect that the actual thief may possibly be one [redacted] aged [redacted], height, 5' 7", weight, 185 lbs., and it is possible that this individual was sentenced at San Quentin, Cal. [redacted]

To assist this office, you are requested to telegraph on May 29, 1937, to Secure, if possible, the name and address of the Los Angeles Police Department covering the theft of \$60,000 in jewelry from the above-named victims approximately seven and one-half years ago in the vicinity of Hollywood, Cal. In view of your telegram of May 29 advising that the Los Angeles Police Department has no record of such a theft and that the informants advised further a theft of jewelry from Gary Cooper occurring on October 10, 1936, advise that their records do not reflect any previous loss of jewelry sustained by Cooper.

This office does not know of the theft of jewelry occurring on October 10, 1936, and it is probable that no violation of the National Stolen

Property Act has been discovered. However, in connection with that loss and the one that may have occurred seven and one-half years ago, as outlined heretofore, it is suggested that you furnish this office with such information as you may obtain, and of course, if a violation of the National Stolen Property Act is disclosed, appropriate investigative attention should be given to such fact. This office will appreciate by telegram of money, instructing that investigation in connection with the above-captioned loss should be discontinued.



Your receipt of the letter from the New York Office dated June 1, 1937, with reference to this matter, containing information relative to the arrest of one [REDACTED], alias [REDACTED] [REDACTED], who was possibly identical with the individual sentenced to San Quentin [REDACTED] a check was made at the Los Angeles Police Department by Special Agent Gocher and it was determined that [REDACTED], substantially meeting the description contained in this letter, was arrested by the Los Angeles Police Department, their number [REDACTED] for an attempted robbery of a grocery store at Third and Olive Streets and was sentenced and sent to San Quentin [REDACTED] being subsequently pardoned from San Quentin [REDACTED]. The description of this individual as appearing on his arrest card was as follows:
Age [REDACTED] height 5'11"; hair black; eyes brown; J. F. [REDACTED]

It is noted that in checking these records the above was the only [REDACTED] having a description in any manner similar to that indicated in your letter. In view of the fact that the inquiries made in this district with reference to any \$50,000.00 theft from either Gary Cooper or Lupo Soles have been unproductive in obtaining any corroborating information, it does not appear necessary for any further investigation to be conducted relative thereto, unless a further specific request should be received from your office.

On the basis of the information contained in your letter of June 1, 1937, I am of the opinion that, in view of the negligible results of the two inquiries, direct contact with Gary Cooper and Lupo Soles would be the most practical way of definitely verifying the information furnished by your confidential informant; however, this has not been done by this office to date because as it was believed that your request for a discreet investigation might be predicated upon this belief that the victims themselves might in some way be implicated.

Inasmuch as Gary Cooper is presently under contract with Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, Agent Burkh telephonically communicated with [REDACTED] at that studio, it being noted that [REDACTED] has always been a very reliable source of information for this office. [REDACTED] stated that, to his knowledge, no such sizable theft of jewelry had ever occurred in respect to either of the parties indicated. He subsequently, after having made appropriate discreet inquiries about the studio, advised that he was unable to obtain any information relative to any such theft.

In view of the fact that the Los Angeles file in the above-entitled case indicated that Arnold Kennedy of the Bernstein-Dunphy Corporation, Hollywood, California, insurance brokers, had been contacted in connection with the recent burglary of the Cooper home, an appropriate inquiry was made of Mr. Kennedy by Agent Burkh but he stated that at the time Cooper obtained his present insurance his record showed that he had stated he had never sustained any previous loss of jewelry. Mr. Kennedy further indicated that his records failed to reflect any information showing that Cooper had had any previous insurance on jewelry with any other company than the one he represents.

Special Agent Marvin Morrison telephonically contacted Mr. R. J. Blodow, who is the other large insurance adjuster in Los Angeles, and through him made appropriate discreet inquiries with reference to the instant alleged \$50,000.00 jewelry loss on the part of Gary Cooper and Lulu Velec. After having made an appropriate check in his files, he indicated that they contained a record to the effect that Gary Cooper had only sustained one jewelry loss, that having occurred during the latter part of the year, 1936. In regard to Lulu Velec, Blodow advised that [REDACTED] his great times she had come to this country and knew that she had had a great deal of difficulty in having jewelry insured in view of her unreliable character. He advised that the only jewelry loss which, to his knowledge, Mrs. Velec has ever had was a \$7500.00 diamond necklace which she had lost in a night club in New York City in 1931 at the time she was there apparently in the company of actress Norma Miller and one of his screen visitors. The only record that he has of her having had any insurance on jewelry was one in 1931, which policy was written by Allgeys of London, presumably through the insurance brokers Cooper and Company of San Francisco, California. It is felt that [REDACTED] of time that he has been so instructed advised to Agent Burkh the fact that information relative to every large jewelry loss is brought to his attention, he is positive that neither Gary Cooper nor Lulu Velec could possibly have sustained a loss of such amount in jewelry in the vicinity of Hollywood without his having gained information with reference thereto.

NOTICEABLE STOLEN PROPERTY

Dear Sir:

Upon receipt of the telegram from the New York office dated May 29, 1937, requesting an appropriate direct investigation be conducted for the purpose of determining the name & address of the insurance company covering theft of approximately \$50,000.00 in jewelry from Gary Cooper and Irene Voles about 7½ years ago in the vicinity of Hollywood, there is being set forth herewith the result of the inquiries made by this division.

Special Agent S. J. Gordon, who conducted the investigation with reference to the more recent theft of jewels and property from Mr. and Mrs. Gary Cooper, the information relative to which is presented in the file entitled "Unknown Subject, Mr. and Mrs. Gary Cooper, Victims, National Starlin Property Lost", transmitted Captain [redacted] of the Robbery Detail, Los Angeles Police Department, who advised that while he recently conducted Gary Cooper's holding sustained a loss of jewelry he could not definitely state either the amount or the time that was lost or recovered. Through Captain [redacted] he advised he had no record of the police department's recovery of jewels of this nature from 1933 - 34, the period being the only recent reference therein of any transaction of value of such magnitude in his vicinity of Los Angeles. He also advised that he had no record of the robbery of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Cooper on June 1, 1933, at which date he was working at the [redacted] in Los Angeles, California. A similar check was made by Agent Gordon at the Sheriff's Office, where likewise no record relating to any such loss was obtained.

Special Agent S. J. Gordon, Department of Justice,

[redacted] Los Angeles and with whom extensive confidential reports have been made in the past, and he advised that no information relative to the theft of the part of either Gary Cooper or Irene Voles has been given him in his estimation. He further stated that he could not conceive of these parties in as far back as 1933 by any of the companies represented.

ACTION'S HOME ROBBED

\$18,000 in Jewels Taken From
Gary Cooper's Home

LOS ANGELES, July 27 (UPI) — Burglars broke into the private home of Gary Cooper film star, and made jewelry valued in excess of \$18,000 early today.

The burglary was committed while Cooper and his wife, the former Paulette Goddard, were on vacation in Mexico. According to the actor's dog, discovered that Gary's room had been ransacked.

Director's home looted

Jewelry worth nearly \$300,000 today had been stolen in daring burglaries from the West Los Angeles homes of baby-carrier Cooper, Paramount star, and Sid Hartman, well-known director.

In one instance the thefts occurred while both owners and servants were asleep.

A third burglary reported from the same district was also under police investigation.

William J. Ryan, an amateur Green Director, told police that the robbing of friends' homes at his Holmby Avenue house, plus his own three houses containing \$100,

Cooper's home was broken, with \$25,000 worth of gold, costly dinner plates, dinner and clothing given.

From Hartman's house at 1828 Belgrave road the burglars emerged with \$1000 worth of jewelry, after climbing a terrace in a roadway, forcing open a window, and breaking a glass pane lying on Mr. Hartman's driveway later.

Greatest valuable found in the Hartman residence, police reported, was a \$7500 diamond star cuff-link set.

The robbing of the Cooper estate was discovered by a housekeeper while the actor and his wife, the former Veronica Hollis, were visiting friends.

The embarrassed police learned nothing. The Coopers retained shortly after police arrived on the premises to conduct a preliminary examination.

An inventory showed their losses were about \$10,000 in jewelry alone. Costly dinner plates, dinner, clothing and several other objects brought the total to about \$20,000, they said.

The burglars entered by cutting the screen of a bathroom window and apparently worked quite definitely rapidly.

The young couple found on the grounds of the Cooper home at 11940 Chateau street, were questioned by police but were released immediately.

Among the lost was a \$2000 garnet and ruby brooch, a diamond and ruby ring, a \$250 square cluster bracelet, a \$1000 diamond cluster, a \$3000 pair of diamond and ruby cuff, an \$800 cigarette case and a \$500 compact.

Three who had passed in the vicinity of Ryan's home were Mrs. John Gray, 1137 Cordell Street; Miss A. Flanagan, 116 May Street, Venice, and Mrs. Celia Cole, of South Pasadena Place.


SECOND LOSS FOR COOPERS

While William J. Ryan, Pathé director, was entertaining guests, a "party breaker" cut a bedroom door in the house and took jewels of three guests, amounting \$100, he reported to police.

The movie stars' jewels had

been packed away before Cooper and his wife, the former Veronica Bause, returned from visiting friends.

The burglars gained entrance by cutting the screen of a bathroom window, and arrested many persons before Cooper's dog aroused the housekeeper.

The young couple found on the extensive grounds of the Cooper estate were questioned and released.





