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

- 3. Will develop and furnish any information regarding opening and operation of Deacons of Defense and Justice (DDJ) office in Chicago and the identity of persons involved.

THOMAS indicated that a DDF office has been opened at 1230 South Pulaski, Chicago, and that somewhere around 455 persons have been recruited. New Orleans will attempt to verify or disprove this figure through informants and sources.

"Hot Line" is a radio program on which a controversial figure is usually interviewed. Telephone questions are solicited from listeners which are answered by the interviewee. If we're called - say that they are marching as they did down near Mayor DALEY's home as they did last summer and they ask you for protection. Now maybe, oh maybe 200 or 300 policemen there. Would they feel they needed some protection from you? I mean just say that someone said well here's a good chance for us to have a confrontation. Let's call the Deacons. What would you do in a case like this? Well, we would come in more or less as witnesses to the fact. We wouldn't participate openly in the march but we would be there as spectators and we would be looking out for police brutality and John Bigot coming around and agitating them whereas they have committed them to non-violence. Well, here on the off and on periods that I have been in the city here could stand a lot, could be changed in Chicago here with the police department to make it function a little better. For an instance, on the west side here you see sometimes two white police. Well, a lot of times you see two white policemen in the car together, two blacks together, then you see, at night I see detectives riding four whites in the car. When you see things like this you know

that some black person is going to get abused because when they riding like that that is what they're out there big. Ninet, per cent of the time And this is bad. And if the man really wante to make a change in Chicago then there should be integration Kere. Black and white police together. Would you expect them to give you a welcoming in open arms?

No, I am not looking for any welcome in open arms but just a lot of things that have happened

since I've been in the city in and out here
they have indicated that at this particular
point they were more or less ignoring us and
wondering what's going on.

Just ignoring you. How did you happen to get an interview or conference with Superintendent

The only thing I know that his secretary called my secretary and...

You had put in a request for it.

He is requesting you to come to see him.

Right. It's some more groups that's going
to be there - supposed to be. So, I'll find
out really. Well, I said what's going to be the
topic and she said she didn't know, so I'll find
out when I get there.

Now, getting back to this riot. This is a very sensitive issue here. What do you think will be the major cause of a riot, if there is one? Well, that would go into quite a few parts. The frustration that the black people live in the ghetto from day to day creates a certain

threat of a riot. Then with unemployment, with not being able to be a man of his house or head of the household and then on top of all of that police brutality. I think if a riot occurred will occur from police brutality.

You think that will be the incident that willtrigger it off, as it did in Watts?

That is true.

Do you think the same disastrous results would...

Well, I think if a full scale riot would get

rolling in the city of Chicago it would be much more difficult than the one in Watts.

I would say it would be three times as worse as the LA riot for the location of the city, the way Chicago is located. You have blacks on the north side and the west side and the south side. Now this would create, I think, a more worser riot than the LA riot.

What do you think of the white teenagers who attacked at a Negro last night? If you remember this was in the news today.

Yes, I did. Well, you take a situation like this.
You know these things like this is good to
really point out to the people here in the city
that although they live as though they are in the
North and they expect to live in the different

surroundings they don't feel that they are going to get attacked on the streets and some of them are just misled, and this shows you that whether you are involved in anything as long as you are black you are in it. And he could have been the mayor or the judge or the prosecutor of Chicago, if he'd have been black and he'd have been there at that , particular time he would have got his head whipped. And this is the whole thing. You are black and whether you are a bad black guy or a good black guy, if you are at the wrong place at the wrong time you get messed around. Do you think that slum conditions are as bad in Chicago as the, well, Southern Christian Leadership Conference has said? You know Dr. KING has come up here as you have and established a headquarters on the west side also. Yes, well, after looking over the community I would say that it is worse than what SCLC says that it is because in some way or another I 🛸

What do you think of the civil rights conference which is to be held in Washington next week on June first and second which hopes to alleviate many of the problems of both North and South.

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Well, I find it pretty hard to believe. I went to one of the pre-conferences in Philadelphia and after listening at the discussion there and participating in the discussion I could see plainly that you could have a cavil rights

conferences a year and you are not going to accomplish too much. Mow, the Federal Covernme knows the problem. You got FMI Agents and all. other kind of agents and them the city police have intelligence agents and the man really ought to know the problem better than I do. But now the point is does he intend to do something about it. Now, I don't need to sit around and talk to him 40 or 45 minutes, two 1, hours, three hours and get up and leave and nothing is done. That's just a waste of my time and a waste of his time and a think it's very bad. I don't think too much is going to come out of it. As a matter of fact I am supposed to go to Washington on the first and second and picket it. We are supposed to bring up about 2,000 Deacons.

DEACONS OF DEFENSE AND JUSTICE, INCORPORATED, aka DEACONS FOR DEFENSE AND JUSTICE, INCORPORATED

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17 ' 18 - The Articles of Incorporation of the Deacons of Defense and Justice (DDJ) as on file with the Secretary of State, for the State of Louisiana, reflects that the Deacons of Defense and Justice, Incorporated is a Louisiana corporation domiciled at Jonesboro, Louisiana. The location and business office address of its registered office shall be Amos Service Station (rear), Beach Spring Road, Drawer B, Jonesboro, Louisiana.

"This corporation is organized for the following purposes and to carry on the following purposes:

To instruct, train, "teach and aducate Citizens of the United States and especially minority groups in the fundamental principals of the republican form of government and our democratic way of life; to instruct, teach, train and educate said persons in the provisions of the constitution and laws of the United States and the State of Louisiana, as well as the constitution and laws of any other State wherein this corporation may operate; to instruct, teach, train and educate said persons in the use, value and purpose of the ballot and the right to vote; to instruct, teach, train and educate said persons as to the duties and responsibilities of good citizenship relative to the obligation and duties of the community to the citizen: To further instruct, teach, train and educate said persons in the value of economic, security and in the effective use of their spending power; to inspire in said persons a sense of responsibility and to develop leadership. This corporation has for its further purpose, and is dedicated to, the defense of the civil rights, property rights and personal rights of said people and will defend said rights by any and all honorable and legal means to the end that justice may be obtained. This corporation may establish chapters and conduct its business at any place in this State and else where as permitted by law."

On 4/6/66, a pretext telephone call to 666-0787, the number listed on a pamphlet issued by the Harlem Committee for the Defense of Free Speech, was answered by an unidentified male who stated that neither he nor any of the other persons in the office know who to contact to join the Deacons. he stated he wished he did because he would join. He stated he does not believe there is such an organization in New York at the present time. (The number 666-0787 is listed to the Harlem Unemployment Center, 139 West 125th St.)

advised that he has no knowledge of any planned activities of the DDJ in the Pennsylvania, New Jersey or New York areas.

He stated that is in no way associated with the DDJ and has never expressed an interest in becoming affiliated with the organization. Although did not elaborate, he expressed in his opinion, is not the type of individual the feeling that he would want in the DDJ. advised that EARNIS THOMAS, Vice President of the Jonesboro, Louisiana, DDJ, is presently in Jonesboro, Louisiana, and has not indicated that he has any knowledge of planned activities of the DDJ in Pennsylvania, New York, or New Jersey. emphatically stated that if any such plans did exist, he would certainly be aware of them. that he, himself, has no desire to become active in that area, and has heard no leaders of the DDJ express a desire to leaders of the DDJ express a desire to do so.

Many of the individuals, mentioned herein as being associated with the captioned organization, have also been or are affiliated with other organizations and are now or have been subjects of Bureau cases. The informants, mentioned herein, with the exception of those so indicated, have provided reliable information in the past.

This case was opened to investigate the captioned organization to determine its organizational structure, officers, members and purposes. This case is being closed administratively for the following reasons:

(1) In view of the information previously set forth which indicates that the office, which at one time was rented by under the organization's name, has since been vacated



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(2) The statement made by on 4/24/66 indicating that he has no knowledge of any planned activities of the DDJ in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, or New York, and that if such plans did exist, he would certainly be aware of them.

(4) Other sources, who are familiar with racial activities in the NYC area, were unable to supply any information concerning captioned organization.

This case will be reopened upon receipt of information that the organization has become active in the New York area.

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
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
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
