



Mr. Hoover telephoned from New York and stated that they were leaving by plane at 3:45P.M. Washington time; that the plane will land in Washington. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to have Mr. Glavin meet them at the airport; that neither he nor Mr. Tolson will get out of the plane. Mr. Hoover stated that he wanted Mr. Glavin to bring to the plane his pearl handle revolver and Mr. Tolson's revolver together with the memorandums and papers in a brief case. Mr. Tamm suggested that the plane land in Baltimore and Mr. Hoover stated that Faltimore might draw more attention that Washington. Mr. Hoover stated that if the plane goes to the hangar for oil, Er. Glavin can meet them there. MEMORANDUM Res Telephone conversation Mr. Hoover and Mr. Tamm

Mr. Tamm stated that he had not received any word from Mr.Connelley as yet; that Mr. Connelley expected to get down there about three or four o'clock. Mr. and said that a cable from John Keith concerning the extradition of Kline and Schwarts who are charged with conspiracy but no evidence that either party ever was in America and that Embassy officials in France consider extradition decision immediately necessary. Mr. Tama advised me that he had contacted Judge Holtsoff and asked him if extradition proceedings could be considered for a person charged with conspiracy who had never been in the United States. Mr. Tama informed me that the Judge had advised him that a person can be extradited only if he commits a crime within the territorial bounds of the United States and then becomes a fugitive from justice by fleeing to another country. Mr. Tamm asked me if I wanted the matter placed before Mr. McMahon. I advised Mr. Tamm to write Mr. McMahon a formal memorandum and advise him that it is imperative that we have his decision on the above matter not later than the . close of business today and to make reference to the memorandum which was sent to him the other day which contained the facts of the above case.

I asked Mr. Tamm if Mr. McMahon had said anything more about the Hamm case. Mr. Tamm advised me that Mr. McMahon has not said anything more about it. Mr. Tamm advised me about the investigation in California about the spy case; that that should make a very good case; and that it might involve some of the Vapanese diplomatic service. Mr. Tamm advised me that word hadbeen received from the Navy Department that Mr. McMahon is handling the spy scare case for the Department. Mr. Tamm also informed me that Mr. McMahon resented the fact that the Bureau is sending reports directots the State Department. Mr. Tamm stated that Mr. Whitley had sent Agents Devereaux and Davis to meet the frankenberg women who was due to land this morning; that the New York Police and about twenty newspaper men were also at the dock; but that the Agents succeeded in landing the Frankenberg woman and taking her into custody to the New York Office and thus evading the New York Police and the newspaper men. Mr. Tamm said that a teletype had been received from SAC Whitley last night advising that four separate indictments had been returned against the persons who are in custody in connection with the Bank of Manhattan case.

Conversation with Mr. Tamm.

Mr. Tamm advised me that the New York Police sent out an alarm yesterday according to the papers that Karpis had been seen in Cambridge, New York, yesterday. I told Mr. Tamm that I had not seen this. Mr. Tamm stated that he had called Agent Doherty in Buffalo and instructed him to check on the above. Mr. Tamm advised me of the developments in the Painard case. Mr. Tamm said that Judge Holtzoff had called and given him the developments of the Catherine Klein relief bill. Mr. Tamm advised me about an article in the Washington Herald this morning to the effect that the four major U. S. Agencies will conduct a survey of the attack by strikers on ship operators and that the Justice Department is one of the Agencies in the group above mentioned. Mr. Tamm informed me of a local impersonation case in which a man posed as a G-man and supposedly arrested to girls and took them to a third rate hotel here and criminally assaulted one of them. Mr. Tamm said that the Bureau is working on the case and that the Metropolitan police have charged this man with rape.

Mr. Hoover telephoned from New York City and Mr. Hoover stated that he had reservations on the night plane for New Orleans; that T. Whitley is trying to make arrangements for a chartered plane which will probably leave within the next hour. Mr. Hoover stated that if the plane stops in Washington he would like to some of the memorandums and background for him. Mr. Hoover stated that if the plane stops at Mobile he will have a car meet him; that he will keep in touch with the New Orleans office by radio in order to be advised of any developments or excitement. Mr. Tamm called Mr. Hoover's attention to possible interceptance of radio messages by other people. Mr. Hoover stated that if the plane arrives in Washington without it being known he will go on into New Orleans. Tr. Tamm stated that New Orleans is about sixty five miles from Mobile, that is, by air milesge. Mr. Hoover stated that he would have Magee make reservations in New Orleans for him, but not under his, Mr. Hoover's name.

Mr. Tamm advised that Grace Holdstein has been with Connelley and after three hours questioning, she has given the exact address in New Orleans. Mr. Tamm stated that all has been recommended to her is that we would definitely recommend to the U. S. Attorney that she and Carnie Morris, who is the prostitute with Free Hunter, not be prosecuted for harboring; that she also wanted us to promise that her family would not prosecuted. for harboring. Mr. Tamm stated that we do not have a case against . . them and she was promised this. Mr. Tamm stated that she does not want any money and Mr. Hoover stated that we would pay her anyway. Mr. Tame advised that the apartment is on a boulevard on a very busy corner; that it is a three story apartment house with only one apartment on each floor of the building; that Marpis is on the first floor; that Mr. Connelley is out now looking the place over. Mr. Hoover was advised that there are twelve men in New Orleans; that Brantley, Buchanan and Hurt were going over from Dallas. Mr. Hoover stated that if Connelley wanted any more men, Glavin and Gurnea could board the plane when it stops at Washington. Mr. Hoover inquired of Mr. Tamm if Mr. McMahon had changed his views relative to the West Coast matter. Mr. Tamm stated that he has not talked to Mr. McMahon about this. Mr. Tamm stated that he would go over the matter with Mr. Hanson on his way back to Los Angeles. Mr. Hoover stated that in talking the matter over with the Attorney General, the Attorney General stated that we were to go ahead on the matter.

Mr. Tamm stated that Mr. Hanson desired to have a week of leave in Birmingham on account of his wife's illness. Mr. Hoover stated that this will be all right.

Mr. Tamm talked to Mr. Whitley in ew York with reference to the chartered plane. Mr. Tamm stated that the plane might be chartered in a private name and pay cash. Mr. Whitley stated that he was using official names; that they have to use the official names in order to get the service. Mr. Tamm stated that Mr. Quinn suggested that we go in as private citizens and pay cash for the chartered plane. Mr. Whitley stated that we could probably do this but that he thought it would raise more questions. Tr. Whitley stated that he has used the name of the Bureau and has only contacted two people.

Conversation of Mr. Quinn with the Director.

Er. Quinn advised that he had been unable to get in touch with Er. Gardner of Detroit. The Director stated that he would place the call again tomorrow morning through the Bureau switchboard when he called the office.

Fr. Quinn advised of Mr. Biffle's call relative to the insertion of the Director's D. A. R. speech in the Congressional Record. Mr. Quinn stated that he had answered Mr. Suydam's inquiry concerning the date of the next Police Training School by saying no date had been set. Mr. Quinn stated that he had telephoned SAC McKean relative to the publicity in Boston. The Director stated that either that person is severely disciplined or the Bureau will remove its offices from that building; that the investigation should be handled by the Post Office Inspectors.

Mr. Quinn advised of the report that former SAC Dumm now had a job in the movies. 

Conversation of Mr. Quinn with Director at New York.

Mr. Quinn advised of his conversation with Mr. Suydam re the proposed broadcast by M.B.C. and stated that Mr. Suydam advises he is trying to contact Mr. Lundell. Mr. Hoover stated to tell Mr. Suydam that he, Mr. Hoover, would be very glad to meet the N.B.C. officials in Washington on Tuesday morning; that he would be glad to make available to them the data upon which they could predicate a broadcast provided it is done with the assistance of Courtney Ryley Cooper; and provided further that neither the Director nor any other Bureau official make any radio statement inasmuch as this would be undignified. Mr. Hoover stated he would not talk to the N.B.C. officials in New York and neither had he allowed any of the newsreels to make any pictures. Mr. Hoover also stated to tell Mr. Suydam that the Director would want to have the benefit of Mr. Suydam's judgment in any program which would be submitted for approval. Mr. Hoover stated it would be all right to allow the N.B.C. to state the facts were taken from the files of the Bureau.

The Director informed Mr. Quinn in reference to the matter of the Mational Broadcasting Company's desire to have the Director appear on a radio program, that he will not appear on any commercial radio program whatsoever nor will be permit the furnishing of any information concarning the Karpis case to any commercial program. The Director also stated that the W.B.C. people desire to put on a forty-five minute program, non-commercial, on Tuesday night; that Mr. Lundell of N. B. C. has communicated with Mr. Suydam and been assured by Mr. Suydam that all information concerning the case would be furnished by Mr. Suydam; that the Director had informed Courtney Ryley Cooper that he, the Director, would not be in Washington until late Monday and could see no one until Tuesday and would then not have time to work over the matter and that Mr. Cooper: could so inform Mr. Lundell and state that if the M. B. C. people would have Mr. Cooper do the continuity the Director would have no objection to putting on a program on Wednesday evening with the distinct understanding that the Director would not appear on the program, and the further understanding that the details concerning the chase of the past year would not be given. 

Mr. Hoover telephoned from Philadelphia and Mr. Tamm advised dim. Tracy information received from Mr. Keith relative to the bond case; that Kingin Gendy will appear in New York when his sentence has been served over there. Mr. Tamm stated that Mr. Keith has the bonds. Mr. Hoover stated that he thought this would make a good news story to give out that our man in France has the half million dollars worth of bonds. Mr. Tamm stated that Mr. Keith further advised that Oswald will arrive in New York on Sunday. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to call Mr. Keith today and find out just what the status is. Mr. Tamm was instructed to send to Mr. Hoover at the Hotel New Yorker a short memorandum of facts on this case. Mr. Tamm was further advised by Mr. Hoover that it may be a good idea for him. Mr. Hoover to give this out at New York tonight or tomorrow. Mr. Hoover told Mr. Tamm to inquire of Mr. Keith why he has allowed this man to have his picture taken with him. Mr. Hoover stated that he was leaving for New York City at 1:27P.M., Washington time; that he will be at the New Yorker at about 3:30P.M., Washington time. Mr. Tamm stated that when he talks to Mr. Keith he will have Mr. Keith make tentative arrangements with the French Plice so that if we need Klein here, they will be able to send Alein over here to us. Mr. Tamm was instructed to send the memorandum by special delivery.

With reference to the situation in Indianapolis yesterday, Mr. Tamm read to Mr. Hoover the memorandum which he had prepared for the Attorney General. Mr. Hoover advised Mr. Tamm to change the memorandum to read "long established policy" instead of well established policy and to include "long established policy laid down by the Department for the Bureau". Mr. Hoover stated further to include"since that investigative agency was in full possession of all detail facts concerning the defendant fugitive". Mr. Hoover asked Mr. Tamm to call Mr. Dowd and inquire of him if anything has appeared in the Indianapolis papers; that if nothing has appeared in the papers the memorandum should be sent around to the Attorney General with his, Mr. Hoover's signature to it and also marked "important and urgent"; that if there has appeared anything, Dowd should contact Val Wolan and tell Nolan that he, Dowd has been informed that Nolan has made such a statement; that he, Mr. Hoover had made inquiry concerning it; that he, Mr. Hoover, wanted to know if it was a fact that he was correctly quoted; that if Nolan says he was correctly quoted send the memorandum around.



Mr. Hoover authorized letter to Vetterli allowing him to speak over Station KYW; also letter to Congressman McCormack re training school; also letter to Congressman Cary re fingerprints.

Regarding the memo from Coffey about fingerprints of Tom Brown, Mr. Hoover stated that his previous criminal record should be checked.

Mr. Tolson advised of the letter from Mr. George Harvey and stated that an answer should be sent out and that the Attorney General should be notified of Mr. Harvey's offer to withhold the sale of the ammunition and make it available to the Bureau.
