Welcome to Göteborg and the draw for the 2009 UEFA European Under-21 Championship in Sweden!



n extra warm welcome and congratulations to the seven countries who made it through the playoffs: Belarus, England, Finland, Germany, Italy, Serbia and Spain. Qualifying for the UEFA Under-21 Championship is one of the most difficult tasks in the world of sport. Winning a qualifying group is not enough you also have to eliminate one more opponent in a two-legged affair, home and away, in order to make it through.

The play-off matches were full of drama, and all were

very tight and tough encounters. Finland qualified after penalty kicks, Spain needed a goal in extra time, while Germany secured their spot in the dying seconds of the return leg!

The evenly contested matches were proof of the high standard of European top-level football today. Standards have been raised considerably, making competition intense – which is good for the quality of the game. This makes the finals in Sweden next summer extremely interesting. All eight participating nations have players of the highest European calibre.

194 days remain until the first match of the 2009 UEFA Under-21 Championship in Sweden. Preparations are well under way, and expectations are high in our host cities Göteborg, Halmstad, Helsingborg and Malmö.

This evening will decide in which host cities, and also when, the different teams will play – we wish all of you the Best of Luck!

Ambassador Henrik Larsson: "Sweden is at its most beautiful in June"




